UCI California Irvine	Abstract: Government authorities in the post-World War II era removed thousands of American Indian children from their families and placed them in non-Indian foster or adaptive families. By the late 1960s an estimated 25 to 35 percent of Indian children had been separated from their families. This was also a global phenomenon; similar practices undermined Indigenous families and their communities in Canada and Australia as well. This presentation recourts both the trauma and resilience of Indigenous women and families as they struggled to reclaim the care of their children, leading to the Indian Child Welfare Act in the United States and to national investigations, landmark apologies, and redress in Australia and Canada.
